### STEP 3 CD:7

Many of the foreign Japanese words written in *katakana* come from English words, but many do not! Some words come from German, others come from Dutch, others come from Portuguese, etc. For example, "arubaito" is not English. That word comes from "Arbeit", which is German, and is "part-time job" in English. "Gipusu" is also from a German word, "Gips." In English it's "cast." Some Japanese words come from the Dutch language, such as "gomu", "biiru", and "koppu." Gomu is rubber, biiru is beer, and koppu is glass in English. And many words come from Portuguese, including "buranko", which is "swing" in English, and "miira", which is "mummy." Japanese has words from many languages!
